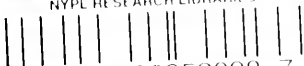

PREFACE.

In sending forth this little volume, the writer feels to preserve facts which have an interest pre-eminently to the descendants of our common ancestor, Reice, and to those allied to the family by marriage. The one problem yet unsolved is the early home of this mysterious young man who was married in Springfield, Mass. in 1645. It may be by thus directing the attention of many to this question, new light may be thrown upon it.

In compiling this book, the principal sources of information have been the original town records of Northampton, Springfield and West Springfield in Mass., and of Suffield in Conn. Church records, particularly those of West Springfield, have also afforded much help. For later dates we have depended upon correspondence with persons representing the different families.

The plan of the book is simple. A chapter is devoted to each generation. The first page in the index gives the birth and descent of an individual, the second his marriage and family. The abbreviations will be easily understood: b. for born, d. for died, and unm. for unmarried. If mistakes have occurred, or if facts have been overlooked, the corrections may be included in an appendix by communicating with the writer.

To all, who have kindly assisted by sending their family record, the writer herewith tenders her thanks.

The first mention of Reice Bodurtha, the ancestor of all in this country bearing the name of Bodurtha or Bedortha, is found in the early records of Springfield, Mass., in the year 1641.

From what port he sailed, and where he landed on these Western shores is unknown. The name indicates a Welsh origin, and the traditions held by several distinct branches of the family corroborate this view.

Much discussion has prevailed over the correct spelling of the name, but the earliest signatures yet found give the name unequivocally Bodurtha. In the

town records it is spelled Bedorden, Bedorda, Bedortha, Bodurtha, Bodortha and Bedurtha, according to the fancy of the recorder seemingly. Those who bear the name will testify to the difficulty which all strangers meet in its pronunciation, and to the variations which are often heard.

Taking into account the fact that, in the early days of our country, the art of writing was by no means universal, and that the ear was depended upon alone, for the transmission of names, it will not seem so strange that these changes should occur. In the early days of the Springfield Colony, or Plantation of Agawam, as it was then called, when no stranger was allowed to remain more than ten days without vouchers, Reice Bodurtha must have satisfied the jealous guardians of the public peace of his honesty and good intentions, for he was granted a lease of land in 1644, and in the year following, 1645, he was granted a house lot by the Plantation. This house lot lying on West side of Main street, Springfield, extended from "Ye streete fence to Ye great river," Lombard street marking its south boundary (according to Henry M. Burt). Griffith Jones was neighbor on the north, and Deacon Benjamin Cooley on the south. Added to this was the grant of the wet meadow and woodland extending in the same line eastward, and a lot over the river in the neck, which together made him a modest little plantation. To this new home Reice took his bride, Blanche Lewis, and here were born their four sons, (1)

John, (2) Joseph, (3) Samuel, (4) John.

Here on the banks of the beautiful Connecticut shut in on the east and south by primeval forests they shared in common with the forty-five families of the Plantation the privations and trials incident to an infant settlement in a new world.

Here also they showed the world an example of a God-fearing, law-abiding Colony, living in peace with their Indian neighbors, and steadily gaining in wealth and intelligence, as well as in sturdy independence.

Additional grants of land were made to Reice Bodurtha in the years 1651, '54 and '60, and in the following year, 1661, house lots were granted to him and to his neighbors, Miles Morgan and Francis Pepper, on the west side of the river "in ye little plaine on this side of Chickabee plain", on condition that they either dwell there or sell to those who would settle there. What led to this determination to seek a newer home we do not know. Possibly a growing family of sons might have suggested the need of a larger farm than could be obtained in that vicinity, or some dispute about imperfectly defined boundaries of land may have had an influence, for a further grant of land in West Springfield was soon after made, the boundary to be "Ye little brook" (since called Darby's brook) in lieu of a wood lot challenged by Reice on the east side of the river.

Still another reason may be conjectured; Springfield, like many of the towns in eastern Massachusetts, shared in the excitement relative to witchcraft which cul-

minated in the trial of Mary Parsons, a near neighbor of the Bodurtha's, for that crime. She was acquitted, but afterwards apprehended for child-murder, but died in jail before her trial. Her husband Hugh, who was a worthless fellow, made some vague threat to Mrs. Blanche for interposing a remark when he was conversing with her husband. This, in those superstitious days when every mind was filled with thoughts of witches, was construed to mean a supernatural appearance, and so when Mrs. Blanche shook out her woolen petticoat, the "electric spark" suggested the fulfillment of Hugh Parson's threat. Her child too was mysteriously ailing, and she testified in court to these facts as proofs of witchery. The excitement soon died away, but the memory of it and the gossip concerning it might not be pleasant to a peace loving man.

At all events the family home was transferred to West Springfield, and here Reice lived till his death by accident, more than twenty years afterward.

If we could lift the veil it would be interesting to learn more of the home life of this handful of settlers in the wilderness, midway between the two larger colonies of Springfield and Westfield. One thing we do know, that they were providentially preserved through the Indian war in 1675, when Springfield was burned. Their salvation was probably due to Major Treat and his Connecticut troops, who marched so bravely up on the west side of the river, to the defense of Springfield.

The year 1683 was a fateful one in the family, for in March, Reice, a son, and the wife of another son, were drowned in crossing the Connecticut. The story of this tragic event as preserved by the family, is that the three were returning from public worship on the Sabbath, when their canoe was upset, and they found a watery grave. It is said that the same day "public prayers had been put up" for the safe passage of Reice Bodurtha to England, whither he intended to sail for the purpose of receiving a legacy lately left him. The preparations for this long voyage even to the Suwarrow boats made for this great occasion are narrated.

The Bodurtha Legacy was believed in by several successive generations and served as a foundation for many a castle in the air.

Honorable mention is made of the name of Reice Bodurtha in all the records. He was one of the common people, devout, liberal, industrious, modest, one whose judgment could be relied upon and one whom his neighbors could trust. As early as 1647 his name appears among several who agreed to raise a certain amount beyond that appropriated by the town for the maintenance of Rev. Mr. Moxom. He filled no great offices, but seems to have been in demand as surveyor of highways on both sides of the river, appraiser of stock, fence viewer, constable and the like. His name figures in court records infrequently; once he was fined for absenting himself from town meeting; once he was engaged in a law suit with John Bagg, growing out of the burning of

a house which he had leased to Bagg; and again he brought suit against a man for setting up a ferry and thereby injuring his home lot.

The Probate Court records of Northampton, Mass. furnishes the following inventory and settlement of his property:

"An inventory of ye estate of Reice Bodortha of Springfield, deceased, was presented to this Court to which ye widow made oath before the worshipful Maj. Pynchon, Esq. Ye power of administration upon said estate is granted to sd' widow viz: Blanche Bodortha and Joseph and Samuel his two sons, and as to settlement of his estate it is referred to a more convenient season.

Here followeth a copy of said inventory taken Mar. 23, 1683, by Jon' Dumbleton and S. Marshfield:—

There is some wheat and other grain in the house for ye widlow but the Corn must be paid out to debts that are now due which cannot at present any account be given of them.

There is some clothing of John Bodurtha that is not in the inventory of his father's estate.

Mr. Samuel Marshfield of Springfield presented to this Court an agreement of ye relict of Reice Bodurtha with her children in order to ye deceased Estate as to a settlement who died intestate: ye agreement following—

Whereas an inventory of o'r fathers estate being presented to this Court and power of administration being granted to our deare and tender mother and ourselves but no division or settlement as yet hath been and now with ye consent and good liking of o'r mother we have made a division ourselves, entreating ye Court to confirm ye same. As for our honored and aged mothers comfortable livelihood during ye time of her natural life, we do jointly agree that we will pay her eight pounds by ye yeare, and she shall have one or two Cows as she shall desire and one Mare and Colt to her own use, and which we will find them stuff, and be at all charges about them; and if by reason of sickness or any other way we do engage to supply her in any wants during her life.

We do agree, Joseph, being the eldest son, shall have a double portion out the land and in particular in ye 30 acre lot at the upper end of Chickapy plain he is to have 20 acres on the North side of said lot and so to run through; and in ye lower lot in ye same field being 20 acres Joseph is to have 2-3 on the northerly side of said lot and so to run through; and as for the house lot that was bought of Francis Pepper Joseph is to have the whole; and the house lot which was father's, we do agree to divide it equally between us, ye one to have one half, the other to have ye other half.

And as for all other out lands we do agree to divide them ourselves, Joseph to have two thirds and Samuel to have one third; if that we cannot divide to our content by one taking one piece the other taking another piece.

And as to the dwelling house Joseph is to have the whole to himself, Samuel to have the barn whole to himself.

We have agreed that Samuel shall have ten acres in the South side of 30 acre lot and to have a third of 20 acre lot on the south side of it and to have a half father's home lot, and a third of all out land, and one yoke of oxen that were fathers, and a horse, ye cart and irons belonging to ye cart, a plough chain, a pair of plow irons, a —yoak, a Musket, a Sword, then leaving mother two Cows a Mare and a Colt and such necessary household stuff as may be for our mother's use.

Joseph is to have all other movables and ye half acre of land which was our fathers, by Samuel Marshfield, and all debts that are due to ye estate and ye remainder of the stock only what is due for a cow killed, Samuel is to have his share of it, towards paying the debts due from the estate.

And as to payment due from ye estate we do agree that Joseph shall pay two thirds and Samuel one third of all kinds of debts whatsoever, to particular men or rates otherwise contracted.

The Court approves of ye above settlement of ye estate of Robert Bodintha and confirmed it this 25th March 1654.”



CHAPTER II

The eldest son of Reice and Blanche Bodurtha, (1) John died in infancy, and another son bearing the same name, (4) John was drowned in early manhood unmarried.

Two only, (2) Joseph and (3) Samuel were left to become heads of families and perpetuate the name. Their homes which were established in West Springfield before their father's death continued there, and their ashes doubtless repose in Cold Spring Cemetery. A monument erected there by the citizens of the town to commemorate the early settlers, records the name Bodurtha as among the number.

(2) Joseph who was born Jan. 15, 1649 married Jan. 30, 1672 Mary Dumbleton. She left one son, dying at his birth.

The title of Lieutenant given to Joseph in Dr. Lathrop's parish records, indicates that he must have been actively engaged in the earlier wars of the Colony.

The exact date of Joseph Bodurtha's death is not known. In 1707 when the land on the West side of the Connecticut river, the Commons as it was called, was divided into ten acre lots and assigned to the 73 males over 21 years of age, Joseph Bodurtha, Sen. received his portion; but in 1723 when a second division was made the heirs of Joseph are mentioned.

(3) Samuel, b Oct. 1, 1651.

The Indian war, called King Philip's war, which threatened the very existence of the infant settlements in the valley of the Connecticut, was inaugurated in

this vicinity, by the burning of Springfield in 1675. Following this, attacks were made on Hadley, Deerfield and Northfield, and the protection of these various places called out all who could bear arms. Samuel Bodurtha's name appears in the list of men under Capt. William Turner, who were engaged in the celebrated "Falls Fight," a few miles above Deerfield, May 19, 1676.

April 28, 1681, Samuel Bodurtha married Mercy Dumbleton. Their children were:

SAMUEL'S DESCENDANTS.

(16.) Samuel, b. Feb 27, 1682, d. May 4, 1757.

No record of marriage is found, and the little we learn of Samuel is in connection with the Indian wars. The Indians, incited by the French, continued their barbarous warfare, attacking and murdering the inhabitants of the upper settlements on the Connecticut river whenever they were found unprotected, or carrying them captive to Canada, to be ransomed by their friends. In Sheldon's History of Northfield, we read: "as our town seemed singled out for destruction, the Governor and Council judged it necessary to give the inhabitants more efficient protection, and Nov. 9, 1723 sent a Captain's Commission to Lieut. Kellogg, with orders "to raise a company, forty of which were stationed at

Northfield, and the rest to be kept constantly on the alert, and to scout on the river in places most likely for the discovery of the enemy's motion, and thus protect Northfield, Deerfield and Sunderland." "The names of the men who performed this service are worthy of record in the Northfield Annals, and are as follows: Samuel Bodurtha, Benjamin Bodurtha, etc."

In the "Muster Roll of Capt. Kellogg's Co. Nov. 20, 1723 to May 30, 1724," are the names of Samuel and Benjamin Bodurtha, and in 1725 among the twenty from West Springfield is Thomas Bodurtha, another brother.

In 1736 Samuel represented his father's family when a grant of land was made by the Massachusetts Legislature to the survivors and heirs of those engaged in the Falls Fight in 1676. A still larger grant was made in 1741, the whole tract being known as Falls Fight town, until 1762 when a part of it was constituted a town, and named Bernardston.

In the year 1727, he administered the estate of his brother Thomas. A letter from him the same year to Rev. Elisha Callender, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Boston, reads as follows: We, the subscribers, are hesitating in the doctrine of infant sprinkling, and

desire further instruction to understand the true institution of baptism according to the word of God, and to be in the use of all proper means to attain the same, &c.

Signed, Joseph Bodurtha,
(and twelve others.)

Eight years after in 1735, he was admitted to full communion to the First Congregational Church, West Springfield, Rev. Samuel Hopkins, Pastor.

Nov. 10, 1762, a Church of Christ was incorporated in the 6th Parish of Springfield, which embraced the present villages of Agawam and Feeding Hills, the members of which were: Samuel Mirick, Joseph Bodurtha, Benjamin Leonard, John Leonard, Reuben Leonard, Joseph Selden, Joseph Flower, Abel Leonard, Jonathan Bodurtha.

By letter, Mary, Joanna and Bathsheba, the wives of the three brothers, Joseph, Jonathan and Benjamin, joined the Church the same day.

No public record of Joseph's death is found. One of his descendants gives it March, 1783.

We are indebted to the same history (Sheldon's) for the following:

"Sept. 13, 1725, Lieut. Childs wrote from Deerfield to Col. Partridge:—This morning there came a man from a scout sent out by Captain Dwight from Fort Dummer, who informs that there were six men in the scout, and last Saturday about 2 o'clock, about six or eight miles west of North River, they sat down to eat, and in a few moments after they sat down they discovered some Indians on their track within about eight rods of them, and they jumped up and ran about seven or eight rods, and then the Indians made a shot upon them, and they turned and shot again upon the Indians, and he says he saw two of them fall and they were forced to scatter. Thomas Bodurtha of Springfield, and John Pease of Enfield were killed. Three were taken prisoners, and Anthony Weirsbury only escaped and returned to the fort. Of this tragedy in the wilderness thus briefly told, absolutely nothing more has been found."

A letter bearing the intelligence of his death to his father, is preserved in the family, a copy of which is given.

Deerfield, Sept. 22, 1725.

Hon'd Father,

After my Humble Duty presented, these come to give you the Heavy tidings of my loving brother Thomas' Death & that I & my brother Benj' have been out to ye Place where he was slain & found his body & buried it, he was not stripped of his

Clothing but was scalped he was shot with two bullets & the Indians had taken his gun & his pack, we do conclude that ye number of ye Indians was more than double ye number of ye English. Ye English all fired once on ye Indians & some ye second time. I should have come down now to see you but I am something lame & ye danger of traveling hath put me by at present. I pray God to support you to bear up under his heavy hand & grant that we might all be spiritual gainers by this grievous providence.

I take leave to subscribe myself your Dutiful Son.

As has already been said, Benjamin with his brothers Samuel and Thomas, was concerned in Indian warfare, but lived to a good old age, finishing his days in the home of his son John. The date of his death is not known.

Jonathan united with the First Congregational Church in West Springfield, under the pastoral care of Rev. Samuel Hopkins, Feb., 1734. He was afterward one of the constituent members of the church formed in the sixth parish of Springfield in 1762, which worshipped in the old meeting house on the plain, midway between Agawam and Feeding Hills.

A copy of the Will of Jonathan Bodurtha is appended on account of its quaintness, and also because it is the earliest one found in the Northampton Records bearing the family name.

“In the name of God, Amen the third day of May 1761.

I, Jonathan Bodurtha of Springfield in the County of Hampshire and Province of Massachusetts Bay in New England, Yeoman.

Bearing in mind the frailty and uncertainty of this mortal life, being in perfect mind and memory thanks be given unto God, therefore knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament that is to say :

Principally and first of all I do give and commend my soul into the hands of God that gave it and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in decent Christian burial at the discretion of my executors nothing doubting but at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God: and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life I do give, demise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form.

Imprimis: I give and bequeath to my son Jonathan Bodurtha Jun. the sum of five shillings lawful money to be raised and levied out of my estate.

I give to my son Stephen Bodurtha whom I likewise constitute, make and ordain my sole executor of this my last Will and Testament all and singular my lands, messages, tenements, by him freely to be possessed, and enjoyed after my decease, supposing he faithfully pay out such legacies as mentioned in the following lines viz :

To Mabel Bodurtha my daughter alias Mabel Stiles the sum of ten pounds lawful money. To Joanna Bodurtha my daughter alias Joanna Smith the sum of five pounds. To Eunice Bodurtha my daughter the sum of twenty pounds lawful money.

And I do hereby utterly disallow, revoke and disannul all and every other former testaments, wills, legacies and bequests and executors by me in any ways before named willed and bequeathed; ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last Will and Testament.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this day and year above written.

Jonathan Bodurtha.

Signed Sealed and Published Pronounced and declared by the said Jonathan Bodurtha. As his last Will and Testament in the presence of us the Subscribers.

(27.) Mercy, b. May 1, 1706, married Israel Phelps of Suffield, January 26, 1744. No children.

The three sons of Samuel, Benjamin, Joseph and Jonathan, received their allotment of the common lands and established their homes in the southern part of West Springfield, which afterwards was incorporated into the town of Agawam, thus preserving the name given by the Indians to a large territory.

These farms rescued from the wilderness are still tilled by the descendants of the brothers, and relics in the form of tools used by them in ye olden time are still preserved.

CHAPTER IV.

(29.) John, b. March 16, 1718. Upon the death of his father in 1732 his mother, Mrs. Ruth Bodurtha was appointed his guardian. As no further mention is made of him, he probably died when young.

The boundaries of Joseph's home lot as given in 1753 are as follows: "On the west side of the Great River bounded east on Ramapaug Street, south, by Broad street, west by brow of great hill, north by Jonathan Ferry's homestead."

Mr. Joseph Bodurtha d. April 22, 1776. Mrs. Lydia his wife, d. February 27, 1815. They were buried in Park Cemetery, West Springfield.

At the death of Mr. Joseph Bodurtha, died the name in the line of Joseph the elder son of Riece, for strangely enough the name cut on the old brown stones in the cemetery is Darby and his descendants have retained it ever since.

Joseph, and Mary his wife, united with the Congregational Church, under the pastoral care of Rev. Sylvanus Griswold, September 5, 1773. October 11, 1791, he was chosen deacon of the church.

A monument in the Main Street Cemetery, Agawam bears the inscription:

Dea. Joseph Bedortha,

Died Apr. 8, 1813, aged 83 yrs.

Mrs. Mary, d. Jan. 24, 1806, aged 68.

From the Massachusetts Militia Rolls, we learn that Joseph Bedortha enlisted in Capt. Nathan Rowley's Company, Col. John Mosely's Regiment, July 9, 1777 and marched to reinforce the Northern Army. He was discharged July 22, 1777.

(38) Benjamin, b. Dec. 26, 1731. His home lot adjoined his brother Samuel's on the east. The date of his death is not known, but his estate was settled by his brother Samuel in 1780 and no mention is made of a family.

marriage was laid beside him, Sept. 3, 1835. Earle Bancroft served in the Revolutionary Army in Colonel Ruggles Woodbridge's Regiment, also in Colonel David Leonard's Regiment.

Stephen Bodurtha was a tanner and shoemaker by trade, and kept a shop which was "headquarters" in those days. During the Revolutionary War he enlisted and marched to reinforce the Northern Army, just as Gen. Burgoyne was swooping down on Fort Ticonderoga.

He and his wife Eleanor were constituent members of the First Baptist Church, Agawam, at its organization in 1790. He inherited his father's farm in Agawam Center, and lived and died on the homestead, and was buried in the cemetery adjoining his land on Main street.

The name Bodurtha, Bedortha, or in its corrupted form Darby, is found in Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Iowa, Missouri, Montana, Georgia, Texas and in England, but the larger number of families still live in Massachusetts. This shows the strong local attachment which is a well known characteristic of the family. The representatives of the daughters of the family are found in many other states, from Vermont on the north, to Florida on the south and from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast. In this little sketch no attempt has been made to trace them after the first generation, as they properly enter into other family histories.

The fact that after two hundred and fifty years of family history only thirty heads of families bearing the name still live, may engage the attention of those who are fond of investigating the problems of life and mortality.
